


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

THE RULES OF ORDER

1. RULES FOR RESOLUTIONS

- 1.1. Resolutions are submitted as the Canons may prescribe.
- 1.2. All resolutions shall be in writing and shall contain the name, parish, or mission, and the city of the proponent. Failing to meet the deadline as set forth in Canon 1, Section 9, the delegate or organization presenting a resolution may introduce such resolutions no later than an hour and a half after the opening of the Convention upon simple majority vote of the delegates. Except for resolutions contained in the reports of Convention Committees, no resolution offered after the opening of convention (the deadline) shall be considered except upon the approval of a simple majority of the delegates present and voting. The delegate or organization presenting a late resolution is responsible for having 250 copies of the resolution reproduced on blue paper for distribution to the Convention. and for sending an electronic copy (in docx or PDF format) to the Secretary of Convention.
- 1.3. The Presiding Officer shall refer all resolutions to appropriate Convention Committees for consideration, recommendation, and report to the Convention, provided, however, upon a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the delegates present a resolution may be considered immediately.
- 1.4. Where two or more resolutions deal basically with the same subject, they shall be referred to the same General Resolutions Committee. The Committee shall make every effort to consolidate them or otherwise assure their compatibility and should also make every effort to obtain the concurrence of the proponents concerned.
- 1.5. Each Convention Committee to which a resolution has been referred, after providing for a public hearing thereon, shall consider the form and substance of the resolution and in making its report shall recommend (a) for adoption, (b) for adoption with amendment, (c) for adoption of a substitute drafted by the Committee, (d) for rejection, or (e) for discharge from further consideration because the subject matter has been included in another resolution. The Committee's recommendation to the Convention shall be in the form of a motion to adopt the Committee's recommendation. If the Committee recommends rejection, the motion shall be on the adoption of the resolution, notwithstanding the recommendation of the Committee for rejection. After this motion has been seconded, the Committee Chairman or other representative shall state the reasons for the Committee's recommendation. Thereafter, the proponent of the original resolution which is the subject of the Committee's recommendation shall be recognized first if he/she so desires. Amendments may be offered, including an amendment to substitute the proponent's original resolution for the one recommended by the Committee.
- 1.6. Any resolution which would require financial resources for its implementation shall address, within the context of the proposed diocesan budget, the source of any financial resources required for its implementation.

2. MOTIONS IN ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

- 2.1. The following motions shall have priority in the order listed. The mover cannot interrupt a member who has the floor, must be recognized, and the motion must be seconded. They are subject to the following rules:
 - 2.1.a. To adjourn or to recess
 - (1). not debatable, if unqualified
 - (2). not amendable

- (3). cannot be laid on the table
- (4). majority vote
- (5). The motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except that it shall not be offered when another member has the floor

2.1.b. To adjourn to Time Certain

- (1). debatable as to the time
- (2). amendable as to the time
- (3). cannot be laid on the table
- (4). majority vote

2.1.c. To Lay on Table or To Table

- (1). not debatable
- (2). not amendable
- (3). cannot be laid on the table
- (4). majority vote

2.1.d. To Vote Immediately or at Time Certain, or to Extend Debate

- (1). not debatable
- (2). amendable, as to time, if a time specified
- (3). cannot be laid on the table
- (4). two-thirds majority vote

2.1.e. To Postpone to a Time Certain

- (1). debatable
- (2). amendable as to time
- (3). may be laid on the table
- (4). majority vote

2.1.f. To Commit or recommit to any Committee

- (1). debatable, except as to a Convention Committee
- (2). amendable as to the Committee to which to be sent
- (3). may be laid on the table
- (4). majority vote

2.1.g. To Amend or To Substitute

- (1). Amendments and Substitutes are debatable only when Main Question is debatable.
- (2). One Amendment may be made to each independent; or separate portion of a Resolution; and the right to amend extends only to one Amendment of that Amendment and to a Substitute and one Amendment thereto.
- (3). A Substitute and its Amendment may be laid on the table, but cannot be otherwise voted on until the original matter is perfected.
- (4). majority vote
- (5). Neither the Substitute nor its Amendment shall be voted on (except to lay on the table) until the original matter is perfected.

3. MOTIONS WITHOUT ORDER OR PRECEDENCE

- 3.1. The following motions have no order or priority, but are subject to the following rules:
 - 3.1.a. Appeal from Decisions of Chair
 - (1). debatable
 - (2). not amendable
 - (3). may be laid on the table
 - (4). majority vote. A tie vote sustains the Chair.
 - (5). must be made immediately after decision
 - 3.1.b. To take from Table
 - (1). not debatable
 - (2). not amendable
 - (3). cannot be laid on the table
 - (4). majority vote
 - 3.1.c. To Recall from Committee
 - (1). debatable
 - (2). amendable
 - (3). may be laid on the table
 - (4). two-thirds majority
 - 3.1.d. To Create Special Order of Day for a Particular Time
 - (1). debatable
 - (2). amendable as to time
 - (3). cannot be laid on the table
 - (4). two-thirds majority vote
 - 3.1.e. Call for Order of the Day
 - (1). Mover may interrupt a member who has the floor and is not required to be recognized or to have a second
 - (2). not debatable
 - (3). not amendable
 - (4). cannot be laid on the table
 - (5). No vote required, but two-thirds majority vote is necessary to suspend general or special order
 - 3.1.f. To Suspend the Rules or Take Up Business Out of Order
 - (1). debatable
 - (2). not amendable
 - (3). cannot be laid on the table
 - (4). two-thirds majority vote
 - 3.1.g. To Divide the Question
 - (1). not debatable
 - (2). can be amended
 - (3). cannot be laid on the table

- (4). majority vote, if vote required
- (5). may be made without being recognized and even though another member has the floor
- (6). If the Question under debate contains several distinct propositions which are independent of each other, at the request of any members the same shall be divided and a separate vote shall be taken, but the motion to strike out and to insert shall be indivisible.
- (7). If the propositions relate to the same subject, and yet each part can stand alone they may be divided only on a regular motion and vote.

4. **RECONSIDERATION**

- 4.1. Neither a Question once determined, nor one of like import, shall again be brought before Convention, except on motion to reconsider made by one who voted in the majority, and seconded by another who voted in the majority.
- 4.2. Motions to reconsider are subject to the following further rules:
 - (1). debatable when motion to be reconsidered is debatable
 - (2). not amendable
 - (3). may be tabled
 - (4). two-thirds majority vote
 - (5). no question can be twice considered unless it was materially amended after its first reconsideration

5. DECORUM AND DEBATE

- 5.1. No member shall be absent from Convention, unless given permission or be unable to attend.
- 5.2. No member shall address the Convention or make any motion until after recognition by the Bishop, except to make a parliamentary inquiry, a point of order, or a motion not requiring recognition.
- 5.3. When any Delegate is about to speak, the Delegate shall address the Bishop, state name, parish or mission, and be confined strictly to the point of debate.
- 5.4. Except by leave of the Convention, no Delegate shall speak more than twice in the same debate nor longer than five minutes at one time.

6. VOTING

6.1. Nominations for Deputies to General Convention, Standing Committee, members of the Bishop and Council, members of the Dandridge Trust Board, which are in writing and contain the nominee's name, parish or mission, and city and not more than one hundred words of biographical information including past and present service of the nominee to the Church at all levels and received in the office of the Secretary fifteen days prior to the opening of convention shall be included in the Convention brochure, except for nominations to the Bishop and Council to be received at the caucus of convocations pursuant to the Order of Business.

Additional written nominations for these offices may be made in like manner by filing with the Secretary of Convention before noon of the day prior to the opening of the convention. All such nominations shall contain the name, parish or mission, and city of the nominator who shall obtain the nominee's consent and willingness to serve prior to submitting the nomination.

Nominations may be made only by the Bishops of this Diocese, the Clerical and Lay Delegates, and any other person authorized by Canon.

- 6.2. Balloting for the offices set forth in 7.01 shall commence not earlier than 9:30 AM on the Friday of the Convention.
- 6.3. In elections of Deputies to the General Convention, members of the Bishop and Council, and members of the Dandridge Trust Board, elected members of the Cathedral Chapter, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary for election. In all other elections, including that of Alternate Deputies to General Convention, a plurality shall suffice. If the Convention shall take up other business while ballots are being counted, such business may be interrupted for the report of tellers and additional ballots.
- Unless otherwise expressly provided, any rule requiring a specified majority shall be construed to mean the affirmative vote of the specified majority of the Delegates present and voting.
- 6.5. Ballots with more or fewer votes than there are positions to be filled shall be declared invalid.
- 6.6. A vote by orders shall mean a specific vote by lay and clergy delegates and shall require passage in each order. [See Article VI of the Constitution]
- 6.7. In the event that there are two nominees from the same parish or mission for the Standing Committee, or the Bishop and Council, the two candidates, regardless of order, may stand for election. The candidate receiving a majority and/or the highest number of votes shall be elected and the other candidates shall be declared ineligible for the office due to canonical restriction.
- 6.8. In the event that nominations might lead to the election of more than one (1) retired clergy person to the Bishop and Council -- as would be prohibited by the provisions of Canon 6, Section 7(b) -- the following Rule shall apply: (1) if a retired clergy person has been elected for the coming year, any further nominations of a retired clergy person will be ineligible for election to office due to canonical restriction; (2) if two or more retired clergy members receive a majority vote in a ballot, the candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected; (3) the elections by the Annual Convention shall be concluded, and announced, before the missionary convocation elections are held; (4) if no retired clergy person has been elected at large, and if two (2) or more retired clergy persons are elected contemporaneously at missionary convocation elections, the Annual Convention will hold a run-off ballot between those so elected in order to elect a single retired clergy member of Bishop and Council and in their run-off ballot, a simple plurality shall suffice to elect, the provisions of general Rule 8.03 notwithstanding, and the missionary convocation or convocations then having no completed clergy election will reconvene and elect a clergy person to Bishop and Council before the adjournment of the Annual Convention; and (5) for clarity a "retired clergy person" shall be defined as a clergy member who is receiving pension payments from the Church Pension Group or a clergy person who is seventytwo (72) years of age.

7. COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

7.1. Whenever so ordered by a vote of the majority of members present the Convention may go Into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of any matter.

8. UNANIMOUS CONSENT

8.1. By unanimous consent, any action may be taken that is not in contravention of any provision of the Constitution or the Canons.

9. GENERAL REGULATIONS

9.1. Except with the express permission of the Bishop or when otherwise ordered by majority vote of the Convention, no books, pamphlets, or other printed matter may be distributed within the Convention Hall, or be placed on the seats or desks of the Delegates; but this prohibition shall not apply to Resolutions, reports, and other documents prepared or distributed by the Secretary of the Convention or to ballots for elections.

10. ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER

10.1. Except when in conflict with the Constitution and Canons, or any Rules herein contained, the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the interpretation of these Rules and procedures to be followed.

11. AMENDMENTS

11.1. These rules may be amended at any time by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present.



Question Responses



- My theological understanding of the Cathedral Chapter is based on a parallel to the ministry of a Deacon. As a Deacon serves as a bridge that brings the needs of the community to the church, and brings the offerings of the church out into the community, I also see the work of the Chapter functioning as a type of bridge. As such, I see the Chapter serving in support of gathering the best of what the Cathedral is and does, and extending that outward to the Diocese. In this way, the Cathedral's calling to be servants, stewards, and friends has an opportunity to impact other Parishes as well as the broader Diocese.
- 2) How is your understanding of the mission of the church related to the office for which you are a candidate?
- It is my understanding that the primary mission of the church is to proclaim the Good News of God in Christ, to make disciples of Jesus, and to baptize them in the name of the Trinity. This mission is carried out in specific, local contexts that are composed of particular needs, resources, and cultures. Within this mission, reconciliation and transformation take place within and around our Parishes. The Cathedral Chapter participates in this mission, as it helps the Cathedral to serve as a beacon and an encouragement within the Diocese.

To: The 193rd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Tennessee From: The Standing Committee on Constitution and Canons

Pursuant to Canon 30 of the Constitution and Canons for the Episcopal Diocese of Tennessee, the Standing Committee on Constitution and Canons reports that it has met and is recommending to the Convention that Canon 26 Sec. 2.01 be amended to remove the nine member cap on the diocesan Disciplinary Board. The Standing Committee on Constitution and Canons for the Episcopal Diocese of Tennessee recommends the adoption by the Convention of the following:

Text of Resolution:

RESOLVED, that Canon 26.2.01 Disciplinary Board ("Board") is hereby amended to read as follows:

The Board shall consist of no fewer than nine persons, five of whom are members of the number of Clergy and four of whom are shall always exceed the number of Laity by one.

Explanation:

Due to the requirements of the Title IV disciplinary process, and the need to ensure an adequate number of disciplinary board members to effectively carry out the work of the board in a timely manner, this amendment is proposed to bring our diocesan canons into greater alignment with the Canons of the General Church (Canon IV.5.1) which stipulate only a minimum number of members, and not a maximum number.

Funds held at the Episcopal Endowment Corporation (EEC) generate quarterly distributions, which is represented in the investment income lines. Distributions are calculated at 4% of a 3 year rolling average of year end investment values.

STEM churches contribute a percentage of their projected annual income each year.

2024 restricted contributions is designated for seminarian assistance and other EEC restricted contributions.

Lease income represents rent from the cottage located on the property at the Diocesan House. This income is transferred to the EEC annually. The current lease expires in February of 2025.

Dear Clergy Members, Vestries, and Mission Councils,

On behalf of the Bishop and Council of our Diocese. I write to present this year's Fair Share request to your congregation.

The Fair Share offerings contributed by our parishes and missions constitute the largest and most significant source of support for our shared mission and ministry in Middle Tennessee. Without the robust commitment of our congregations, our work together would be impossible. The Faithful and Focused Annual Fund, and income from endowment and other sources, provide necessary support, but the Fair Share contributions are the most vital part of our annual budget.

Several decades ago, our Annual Convention made the decision to set our Fair Share request at 10% of a three-year rolling average of congregational income. The Convention wisely decided to keep our resources at the most local level, to enable the good work of our congregations. The Fair Share then established is a voluntary system, to avoid the burden of an exemption process, or the imposition of penalties for non-compliance. As St. Paul writes, the Lord loves a cheerful giver (2 Corinthians 9:7).

At present, the Diocese of Tennessee is fully compliant with the mandatory Assessment from the Episcopal Church, which is set at 15% of a three-year average of income. For the better part of a decade, the Diocese has absorbed the difference between the 10% Fair Share and the 15% Assessment, still convinced that our resources are being put to their best use by not passing on to our congregations the additional cost of this Assessment. We give thanks to the Lord Jesus Christ for our ability to do this.

For the past several years, our Annual Budget has plateaued, in spite of an increase in congregational income, as the sum total of Fair Share commitments has gradually decreased to an average of 8% rather than 10%. The difference is significant, with impact on the ministries that we can undertake together. Many congregations are honoring the Fair Share request at the full asking; others are taking steps toward meeting this 10% voluntary contribution.

I ask you and your congregational leadership to review together the history of your Fair Share commitment to the Diocese of Tennessee over the past several years, to ensure that your response is made prayerfully and intentionally. God has blessed our congregations with abundant resources, more than enough for the mission and ministry that we are called to. In asking our parishioners to contribute to our parishes and missions, we can also point to the good work that their offerings are making possible throughout the Diocese of Tennessee through the Fair Share offering of our congregations. It is an inspiring story.

Thank you for your attention to this vital part of our life together as a Diocese. You remain in my prayers. In turn, I ask your prayers for all our clergy and congregations in the Diocese of Tennessee.



THE EPISCOPAL ENDOWMENT CORPORATION

The Episcopal Endowment Corporation was created by a gift from Mrs. Delia Baxter Robinson of Nashville upon her death on June 15, 1932. She was the wife of Augustus Hammond Robinson who was born on May 23, 1844 and died in 1919. The bequest from Mrs. Robinson is a permanently restricted gift and its legal title is "The Augustus Hammond Robinson Memorial Episcopate Endowment Fund." For some eighty years, this fund has supported the Episcopate. Moreover, it paved the way for the Dioceses of Tennessee and East Tennessee as well as many congregations to invest and hold long term funds.

The EEC ended 2022 with a market value of \$45 million. The Fund's performance continues to be a most attractive long term investment vehicle for both dioceses and their individual congregations. The EEC Board voted to continue the 4% spending rate into 2024. The amount available for distribution is based on the average of the previous three years year-end market value.

BELOVED COMMUNITY: COMMISSION FOR RACIAL RECONCILIATION

The Beloved Community Commission continued in 2023 to focus our efforts in two primary ways: formation and awareness building. We hosted a variety of events, organized in-person and virtual community building, and facilitated multiple educational opportunities. Our communications efforts have been more frequent, offering e-newsletters to 260+ subscribers every other week. We have facilitated virtual visits to parishes, connected the diocese to antiracism resources, facilitated book discussions and virtual gatherings, and met with clergy to discuss issues of racism.

We continue to be involved with NOAH - Nashville Organized for Action and Hope - and participate in events about local issues, such as the local Police Community Oversight Board, mass incarceration, the death penalty, and community organizing. We are fortunate that one of our members represents the commission at NOAH meetings regularly, and particularly this past year was active in NOAH'S Integrated Voter Engagement subcommittee.

Our efforts continue to be focused on providing space for people to deepen their understanding of how racism manifests in our society and impacts our existence as the Beloved Community, by:

- leading education and training opportunities
- strengthening connections with churches already involved in the work
- rapidly building a foundation to accommodate increased interest
- raising conscious awareness

Anti-Racism Training of the Diocese

The BCC received approval and affirmation from the 191st Diocesan Annual Convention to continue Anti-Racism Training efforts in this Diocese, providing for the Clergy of the Diocese, the Clergy licensed to officiate, Sr. Wardens, the Diocesan staff, the members of the Standing Committee, and the members of the Bishop and Council. The training, however, was opened to anyone wishing to participate.

The Training and Education sub-committee continued to meet throughout 2023, and began the first curriculum revision of the Participant Guide and Facilitator's Manual. We are grateful for the guidance and assistance from Bishop Bauerschmidt, Canon Jody Howard, as well as Sandra Beld..

Here are some Anti-Racism Training statistics by the numbers for the year 2023:

- 8 trainings offered throughout the Diocese
- 6 locations of those 7 trainings includes parishes and the Diocesan House
- 10 facilitators that the commission has currently
- 81 participants in the Diocese who have completed the one-day training
- 2 parishes who invited the commission to offer the training for their entire vestry and/or staff

Commission Sponsored Activities

Feast of Absalom Jones:

In February, the 7th Annual Diocesan-wide celebration of the Feast of Absalom Jones took place at Christ Church Cathedral. The Rev. Dr. Deborah Jackson, Associate Dean for Community Life, School of Theology at the University of the South in Sewanee, was the preacher. The Right Rev. John C. Bauerschmidt was the celebrant. Musical Guests were the Consort Choir, St. Paul's Episcopal Church Franklin and the Purple Martin Choir, The Episcopal School of Nashville. We collected and donated funds to two Episcopal HBCUs.

Book Study:

A four-week book study on The Church Cracked Open: Disruption, Decline, and New Hope for the Beloved Community written by Canon Stephanie Spellers was offered via Zoom for anyone in the diocese.

Walk in Love:

In April, the BCC commemorated the 63rd Anniversary of the bombing of Dr. Z Alexander Looby's home and the peaceful protest that followed. A BCC – developed curriculum about Looby, a Lawyer and Civil Rights Leader in Nashville and member of Holy Trinity, Nashville, was offered via Zoom for anyone wishing to join in the education and discussion.

VOCATIONAL DIACONATE COMMITTEE

The Vocational Diaconate Committee oversees the two-year Deacon School for the formation of new Vocational Deacons in the Diocese of Tennessee. Postulants enroll in the formation program for a period of two academic years.

Classes convene monthly and students engage a variety of learning resources, including a wide range of video lectures, required readings, group discussions, and a range of learning methodologies.

Much of the curriculum content has been made available through a partnership between the Diocese of Tennessee and the Iona Collaborative, a collaboration of the Seminary of the Southwest in Austin, Texas, and over 30 dioceses of the Episcopal Church. The two-year formation program includes the following:

2023 - Celebrating the Past Year (2022-23)

Eight years ago, the Episcopal School of Nashville opened its doors determined to offer an educational opportunity to the children of Nashville unlike any other. Through innovative, individualized curriculum that meets students where they are and a foundation rooted in the Episcopal tradition, ESN is charting a singular path for the future of education in Nashville. As the only Episcopal school serving students beyond Kindergarten in the city, and an institution with a 5-to-1 student-to-teacher ratio, ESN is uniquely positioned to offer personalized, one-on-one attention to each of our students on an unparalleled level. Our location in East Nashville gives our students the opportunity to live and learn in the heart of one of our country's fastest-growing cities, while maintaining a tight-knit, community feel where all are welcome.

As an outgrowth of our Episcopal identity, we are a school rooted in inclusivity, compassion, and a dedication to ensuring that every child who walks through our doors is treated with love and respect. Our charge every day is to nurture the joy of learning and spirit of discovery in our students. We do not merely develop test-takers; rather, we shape the next generation of compassionate, well-rounded leaders who are confident, curious, creative, collaborative and can think critically.

The Episcopal School of Nashville was founded on the belief that we should provide an excellent independent school education to children who would not otherwise have access to one. We have proved our dedication to that mission, which we see as founded upon our Episcopal identity. Over 23% of our children come from families of color, and 38% of our families receive significant financial assistance. This is in addition to having a tuition that is in the bottom quartile of all independent and parochial schools in Nashville.

There is a lot of exciting news to report as Episcopal School has grown in the historic Ross Building on Ordway Place. Following are just a few news items from the 2022-23 school year, as well as an announcement regarding the 2023-24 school year at Episcopal School of Nashville:

- Served 156 students from 25 zip codes in grades Pre-Kindergarten through 8th grade and celebrated its very first graduating class in May
- Represented 10 Episcopal congregations and offers chapel services two times a week for all students, as well as Catechesis of the Good Shepherd for our youngest students, and religion classes (Old Testament, New Testament, and World Religions) for our Middle School students.
- Provided almost \$550,000 in need-based financial aid to 38% of its students to allow for students of diverse socioeconomic backgrounds to come together and build community.
- From our year end 2022-23 Measure of Academic Progress (MAP) testing data, 100% of our third graders read at or above the 50th percentile nationally, 94% schoolwide
- After thorough analysis and thoughtful deliberation, the Board of Trustees voted in December to adopt a significant strategic shift and transition the school to a 3K-6th grade model (with sunsetting middle school program) for the 2024-25 school year. This change helps position the school for long term success and financial sustainability (see the handout at the convention table for more details).

Mission Statement

The mission of St. Andrew's-Sewanee School is:

- to be an inclusive Christian community in which the Episcopal heritage is central;
- to provide superior preparation for college;
- to provide educational opportunities for those students for whom such experiences might not otherwise be available;
- to bring all members of the community to a richer spiritual, intellectual, social, physical, and aesthetic awareness, so that they might lead lives of honor and loving service to God and to others.

St. Andrew's-Sewanee School is one of the oldest Episcopal boarding schools in the U.S. We are proud inheritors of a legacy of 155 years of private college preparatory education in Sewanee. The school offers classes to students in grades 6-12 with boarding available to students in grades 8-12.

At St. Andrew's-Sewanee School we enjoy a rich Anglican heritage. Our historic understanding of faith encourages openness and respect for other religious traditions while the school community remains grounded in the history, tradition, and liturgy of the Episcopal Church. Students are encouraged to find their own process to a faith that will provide them with a deeper understanding of life and service.

St. Andrew's-Sewanee School prides itself on maintaining a geographically, racially, religiously, intellectually, and socio-economically diverse student body. We are committed to making our superb college preparatory program available to deserving students. This year 51% of our student population received need-based financial aid. A total of \$1.7M was awarded in 2023, providing assistance to students who would otherwise be unable to attend.

Through an agreement with the University of the South, outstanding juniors and seniors are able to take college courses at no additional cost. In recent years, 32% of the senior class has graduated with college credit. St. Andrew's-Sewanee School challenges students to fulfill their greatest potential while cultivating lives of balance and joy.

Upper school students are required to complete 15 hours of community service for each year (grades 9-12) that they attend St. Andrew's Sewanee School. From dish duty in the cafeteria, to work in a local food ministry, to just being mindful daily of the needs of others, our service is born of our sense of responsibility for the community we live in. When students know one another and their neighbors, it's hard not to lend a hand when one is needed.

2021-2022 Statistics for St. Andrew's-Sewanee School (August 2021 to May 2022) *Collected on the 10th day of classes. Enrollment for August was 236 students which included 72 boarding-students and 164 day-students. The 2021-2022 student body represents 18 states and 13 countries.

The 2022 graduating class consisted of 41 seniors. The 41 members of the graduating class of 2021 received 148 acceptances to different colleges and universities.

2022-2023 Statistics for St. Andrew's-Sewanee School (August 2021 to May 2022) *Collected on the 10th day of classes. Enrollment for August was 233 students which included 61 boarding-students and 172 day-students. The 2022-2023 student body represents 15 states and 11 countries.

The 2023 graduating class consisted of 39 seniors. The 39 members of the graduating class of 2023 received 102 acceptances to different colleges and universities.

2023-2024 Statistics for St. Andrew's-Sewanee School (August 2023 to May 2024) *Collected on the 10th day of classes. Enrollment for August was 212 students which included 45 boarding-students and 167 day-students. The 2023-2024 student body represents 13 states and 11 countries. As ever we are grateful for the hard work of our faculty, staff, and students.

Explanation: In accordance with Canon I.1.1(e), which requires that all dioceses be notified whenever there are proposed changes to the Constitution of The Episcopal Church, or when revisions to the Book of Common Prayer are proposed, we now publish the proposed constitutional changes to inform the Diocese of Tennessee. These proposed amendments are to be shared at Diocesan Conventions.

A031 - AMEND THE CONSTITUTION AND CANONS RELATING TO MERGERS OF DIOCESES

Resolution Text

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention amend Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution to read as follows:

<Amended text as it would appear if adopted and concurred. Scroll below the line of asterisks (******) to see the version showing all deleted and added text.>

Art.V

Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese is formed and erected out of an existing Diocese or out of two or more existing Dioceses or parts of them, the formation process of the newly formed Diocese, including the adoption of its Constitution and Canons, shall be as set forth in the Canons.

<Proposed amended resolution text showing exact changes being made:>

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention amend Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution to read as follows:

Art.V

Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese is formed and erected out of an existing Diocese or out of two or more existing Dioceses or parts of them, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese out of which it was formed, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese the formation process of the newly formed Diocese, including the adoption of its Constitution and Canons, shall be as set forth in the Canons.

Whenever a Diocese is formed out of two or more existing Dioceses, it shall be subject to the Constitution and Canons of that one of the said existing Dioceses to which the greater number of Members of the Clergy shall have belonged prior to the erection of such new Diocese, except as local circumstances may prevent, until the same be altered in accordance with such Constitution and Canons by the Convention of the new Diocese.

And be it further

Resolved, That Canon I.10 be amended to read as follows and voted on at the 81st General Convention:

Can.I.10

Sec. 1. Whenever a new Diocese is proposed to be formed within the limits of any Diocese, or by the junction of two or more Dioceses, or parts of two or more Dioceses, the Ecclesiastical Authorities and the Standing Committees of the Dioceses involved in the proposed new diocese shall submit for approval to the Conventions of each Diocese involved a joint agreement of union setting

forth their agreements, including the manner of determining the Bishop Diocesan and other Bishops (if any), the provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the new Diocese, and such other matters as may be necessary or proper. Upon approval by the Conventions of each of the involved Dioceses, the joint agreement of union shall be submitted for ratification by the General Convention no less than ninety days prior to the first legislative day of the next meeting of the General Convention.

- Sec. 2. Promptly after ratification by the General Convention, the Ecclesiastical Authority of the new Diocese, as set forth in the joint agreement of union, shall call the first Convention of the new Diocese, for the purpose of enabling it to organize, and shall fix the time and place of holding the same, such place being within the territorial limits of the new Diocese.
- Sec. 3. Whenever one Diocese is about to be divided into two Dioceses, the Convention of such Diocese shall declare which portion or portions thereof are to be in the new Diocese, and shall make the same known to the General Convention before the ratification of such division.
- Sec. 4. Whenever a new Diocese shall have organized in first Convention in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and Canons in such case made and provided, and in the manner prescribed in the previous Sections of this Canon, and shall have chosen a name and acceded to the Constitution of the General Convention in accordance with Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution, and shall have laid before the Executive Council certified copies of the Constitution adopted at its first Convention, and the proceedings preparatory to the formation of the proposed new Diocese, such new Diocese shall thereupon be admitted into union with the General Convention.
- Sec. 5. In the event of the erection of an Area Mission into a Diocese of this Church, as provided in Article V, Section 1 of the Constitution, the Convocation of the Area Mission shall be entitled to elect Deputies to the succeeding General Convention, and also to elect a Bishop. The jurisdiction previously assigned to the Bishop in the Area Mission shall be terminated upon the admission of the new Diocese.
- Sec. 6. When a Diocese and one or more other Dioceses that were formed either by division therefrom or by erection into a Diocese or a Missionary Diocese formed by division therefrom, shall desire to be reunited into one Diocese, the proposed reunion must be initiated by the approval of the Conventions of the involved Dioceses of a joint agreement of union setting forth their agreements, including the manner of determining the Bishop Diocesan and other Bishops (if any), provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the new Diocese, and such other matters as may be necessary or proper. If the agreement of the Dioceses is made and the consents of their Conventions are given more than three months before the next meeting of the General Convention, the fact of the agreement and consents shall be certified by the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Secretary of the Convention of each involved Diocese to all the Bishops of the Church having jurisdiction and to the Standing Committees of all the Dioceses; and when the consents of a majority of such Bishops and of a majority of the Standing Committees to the proposed reunion shall have been received, the facts shall be similarly certified to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, and thereupon the reunion shall be considered complete. But if the agreement is made and the consents given within three months of the next meeting of the General Convention, the facts shall be certified instead to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, who shall lay them before the two Houses; and the reunion shall be deemed to be complete when it shall have been approved by a majority vote in the House of Bishops, and in the House of Deputies.
- Sec. 7. When the union of two or more Dioceses or portions of Dioceses or the reunion of the two or more Dioceses shall have been completed, the facts shall be certified to the Presiding Bishop and to the Secretary of the House of Deputies. Thereupon the Presiding Bishop shall notify the Secretary of the House of Bishops of any alteration in the status or style of the Bishop or Bishops concerned, and the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall strike the name of any Diocese that will cease to exist or is being renamed from the roll of Dioceses in union with the General Convention and, if appropriate, amend the name of the newly united Diocese on the roll of Dioceses in union with the General Convention.

Sec. 1. When a Diocese and one or more other Dioceses that were formed either by division therefrom or by erection into a Diocese or a Missionary Diocese formed by division therefrom, shall desire to be reunited into one Diocese, the proposed reunion must be initiated by the approval of the Conventions of the involved Dioceses of a joint agreement of union setting forth their agreements, including the manner of determining the Bishop Diocesan and other Bishops (if any), provisions of the Constitution and Canons of the new Diocese, and such other matters as may be necessary or proper. If the agreement of the Dioceses is made and the consents of their Conventions are given more than three months before the next meeting of the General Convention, the fact of the agreement and consents shall be certified by the Ecclesiastical Authority and the Secretary of the Convention of each involved Diocese to all the Bishops of the Church having jurisdiction and to the Standing Committees of all the Dioceses; and when the consents of a majority of such Bishops and of a majority of the Standing Committees to the proposed reunion shall have been received, the facts shall be similarly certified to the Secretary of the House of Deputies of the General Convention, and thereupon the reunion shall be considered complete. But if the agreement is made and the consents given within three months of the next meeting of the General Convention, the facts shall be certified instead to the Secretary of the House of Deputies, who shall lay them before the two Houses; and the reunion shall be deemed to be complete when it shall have been approved by a majority vote in the House of Bishops, and in the House of Deputies.
- Sec. 7. When the union of two or more Dioceses or portions of Dioceses or the reunion of the two or more Dioceses shall have been completed, the facts shall be certified to the Presiding Bishop and to the Secretary of the House of Deputies. Thereupon the Presiding Bishop shall notify the Secretary of the House of Bishops of any alteration in the status or style of the Bishop or Bishops concerned, and the Secretary of the House of Deputies shall strike the name of any Diocese that will cease to exist or is being renamed from the roll of Dioceses in union with the General Convention and, if appropriate, amend the name of the newly united Diocese on the roll of Dioceses in union with the General Convention.

A059 - AMEND ARTICLE X OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE EPISCOPAL CHURCH (FIRST READING)

Resolution Text

Resolved, That the 80th General Convention of The Episcopal Church repeal Article X in its entirety and replace it with the following:

Sec. 1. The Book of Common Prayer is understood to be those liturgical forms and other texts authorized by the General Convention in accordance with this article and the Canons of this Church.

The Book of Common Prayer in this Church is intended to be communal and devotional prayer enriched by our church's cultural, geographical, and linguistic contexts. The Book of Common Prayer shall contain both public worship and private devotion.

The Book of Common Prayer, as now established or hereafter amended by the General Convention, shall be in use in all the Dioceses of this Church.

Sec. 2. No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless the General Convention approve the same on first reading in one regular meeting of the General Convention and, by resolve so directing, be sent by the Secretary of the General Convention to the Secretary of the Convention of every Diocese, to be made known to the Diocesan Convention at its next regular meeting, and be adopted on second reading without alteration by the General Convention at its next succeeding regular meeting by a majority of all Bishops, excluding retired Bishops not present, of the whole number of Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by an affirmative vote by orders in the House of Deputies in accordance with Art. I, Sec. 5 of this Constitution, except that concurrence in the affirmative by the orders shall require the affirmative vote in each order by a majority of the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies.

Sec. 3. No alteration thereof or addition thereto shall be made unless it has previously been authorized for Trial Use in accordance with this Article and the Canons of this Church.

Sec. 4. The General Convention may at any one meeting, by a majority of the whole number of the Bishops entitled to vote in the House of Bishops, and by a majority of the Clerical and Lay Deputies of all the Dioceses entitled to representation in the House of Deputies, voting by orders as previously set forth in this Article:

- a. Amend the Table of Lessons and all Tables and Rubrics relating to the Psalms.
- **b.** Authorize for Trial Use such alterations or additions in whole or in part to the established Book of Common Prayer as may be proposed in accord with the Canons of this Church and duly undertaken by and implemented according to the directives of the General Convention.
- c. Authorize for use throughout this Church, as provided by Canon, alternative and additional liturgies to supplement those provided in the Book of Common Prayer.

And be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention direct the President of the House of Deputies and the Presiding Bishop to appoint a working group of nine members to include the Custodian of The Book of Common Prayer, some members of Committee 12 of the 80th General Convention, some members of a Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, and others as needed to review the Canons relevant to the implementation of this Article and propose revisions to the 81st General Convention. An initial framework is provided as a starting point for this work; and be it further

Resolved, That an allocation of \$30,000 be made to support the work of the working group.

A157 - AMEND ARTICLE I SEC. 7

Resolution Text

Resolved, That Article I, Section 7 of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 7. The General Convention shall hold its regular meeting not less than once in each three years, at a time and place determined in accordance with the Canons. In the event of a change of circumstances indicating the necessity or advisability of changing the date of such regular meeting of The General Convention beyond three years, said meeting may be rescheduled as provided by Canon. Special Meetings may be held as provided for by Canon.

Sec. 7. The General Convention shall meet hold its regular meeting not less than once in each three years, at a time and place determined in accordance with the Canons. In the event of a change of circumstances indicating the necessity or advisability of changing the date of such regular meeting of The General Convention beyond three years, said meeting may be rescheduled as provided by Canon. Special Meetings may be held as provided for by Canon.
